


I want to thank Steve Corcoran, our immediate past president and the 1999 board for leaving the Section in the good shape that it's in.

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WEBSITE OF THE MONTH

The first website of the month has been around, but showcases an emerging concept: Completely Electronic Toll Roads

The 407 ETR (Express Toll Route) is located across northern Toronto. The tolls are entirely collected electronically with a transponder placed on the windshield. Each motorist is logged into the system upon entering the toll road via one of the 29 interchanges. When leaving the tollway system, each motorist's account is charged for the toll transaction.

Those motorists without a transponder are sent a bill with the use of a state-of-the-art license plate tracking system.

Improving Metropolitan Chicago's Freight Transportation Network

The movement of goods in the United States is vitally important to the nation's economy. Chicago is a crucial link in the freight transportation network, but new investment and improved coordination are needed for the region to retain its title as the nation's freight transportation hub. To move the industry and the region into the next century, the Metropolitan Planning Council, Business Leaders for Transportation and others are hosting a one-day freight transportation leadership conference to be held on Tuesday, February 1, 2000 at the Palmer House Hilton in downtown Chicago.

ITS IN TRANSIT SEMINAR

The Intelligent Transportation Systems' (ITS) In Transit Seminar was presented on November 18 with about 30 attendees, including a few from the Milwaukee area. The presenter was Carol Schweiger of Multisystems, Inc., using materials prepared by the Volpe Transportation System Center (Cambridge, Ma). Following is a summary.

The first part of the three-part seminar was an overview of ITS and its transit elements. identifying the 9 "Metropolitan ITS Infrastructure" elements, Carol emphasized integration, since there is so much overlap (The 9: Transit Fleet Management, Regional Multi-Modal Travel Information, Electronic Fare Payment, Freeway Management, Electronic Toll Collection, Emergency Management, Traffic Signal Control, Incident Management and Highway-Rail Safety). In Advanced Intersection Transportation Systems (APTS), she noted initiatives for traveler information, automatic fare collection and transit traffic signal priority. Most important, benefits accrue to both operators (lower fleet costs, better records management, etc.) and travelers (more convenient fare payment, better knowledge of travel options and conditions, improved mobility for elderly and handicapped persons, etc.).

The second part dealt with APTS technologies broken into transit fleet management, traveler information systems and electronic fare payment. Some fleet management technologies are Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL), Automatic Passenger Counters (APC) and Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) of paratransit vehicles. The aim is to make transit more attractive by improving schedule reliability and operating efficiency, netting better passenger service. AVL, in addition to operator efficiency, enables real-time estimation of transit arrival times (e.g., to downstream bus stops); the CTA is working on such a system. APCs, such as those being installed in about a fifth of Pace's bus fleet, provide accurate patronage tracking and thus better service planning. Transit signal priority - advancing or extending green time for buses, in particular - is the subject of a comprehensive RTA study in the metro area.

Traveler information systems, from automated transit information to real-time ride-sharing systems, spread information via the Internet, interactive kiosks, bus/rail stop displays/annunciators and personal communications devices. The vision of the Gary-Chicago-Milwaukee "Gateway" includes a transit hub

for information dissemination. Electronic fare payment systems, such as the magnetic-strip cards now in wide use on the CTA, reduce cash handling, enhance security and improve passenger convenience. "Smart" cards may be used on several transit carriers, allow a tiered pricing system, and may include auto tolls, too.

The third part covered transit directions and opportunities in ITS. Carol's focus was on the "National ITS Architecture" to increase interoperability and device compatibility, thus reducing risk and cost. She noted the on-going Transit Communications Interface Profile (TCIP), which parallels the similar NTCIP. She also summarized reported ITS transit benefits, such as 8% travel time reductions in Portland due to bus signal priority, large reductions in "silent alarm" response time in Denver, and about \$70 Mil annual savings in fare evasions in New York City. Following the seminar, Chicago metro agency representatives discussed local initiatives at lunch. Angela Johnson discussed RTA activities such as the transit (signal) priority study and parking lot space displays on variable message signs at Metra stations. Barry Resnick of Metra covered "hot" commuter rail issues, particularly the need for park-n-ride lot expansion. Ron Baker outlined CTA work, including the GPS/AVL system, bus/train arrival displays and systems installation of fiber optic lines. Jerry Kotwica in the audience finally summarized the Pace Intelligent Bus System (IBS) initiative, elaborated on APC installation and touched on bus priority opportunities.


All in all, the day was a useful and illuminating look at ITS potential and current applications in the transit field both nationally and locally.




