DECEMBER NETWORKING AND HOLIDAY PARTY


BENEFITING THE ILLINOIS SECTION SCHOLARSHIP FUND

He graduated from Purdue University in Civil Engineering, and then earned an MBA in Public Management from Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management. His work experience in transportation planning and public management was both broad and deep. He worked with CATS, and the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission.

He was Deputy Public Works

Commissioner for Chicago's Major

Jane Byrne, and Budget Director for

Mayor Harold Washington. He later
became Fiscal and Budget

Administrator and then Parks

Commissioner for Milwaukee County.

He completed his career in the public
sector in a four year term as elected

County Executive of Milwaukee County.

Dave's passing is a significant loss for ITI, the transportation community, but most importantly for those of us who knew him well as a friend, a supporter, a mentor, and sometimes a debating partner.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The following abbreviated summary of legislation passed by the Illinois General Assembly in 2007 was provided by the American Council of Engineering Companies of Illinois (ACEC-IL). The entire report with links to copies of particular bills can also be found on the ACEC-IL website at http://www.acec-il.org/leg_report.cfm.

Note: HB = House Bill; SB = Senate Bill; and PA = Public Act.

AIRPORTS

HB 4/PA 95-641: Adds a member to the Springfield Airport Authority Board.

SB 263/PA 95-365: Creates the Greater Metropolitan Airport Authority in Peoria County, and the Crawford County Airport Authority.

CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT BOARD

HB 1355/PA 95-101: Requires CDB to give preference to historic properties for state facilities.

DBE ISSUES

SB 336/PA 95-344: Amends the Business Enterprise for Minorities, Females and Persons with Disabilities Act allowing certification on a per contract basis.

DESIGN/BUILD

HB 3490/PA 95-595: Amends the Public Building Commission Act authorizing limited use of design/build starting in June, 2008.

EMINENT DOMAIN

SB 1042/PA 95-611: Authorizes quick take

eminent domain to the City and County of Champaign and Savoy for a particular road project.

ENVIRONMENTAL

HB 496/PA 95-121: Amends the Environmental Protection Act affecting the reclamation of asphalt pavement waste.

HIGHWAYS

SB 308/PA 95-271: Requires IDOT to fund and repair within the highway right-of-way entrances to public schools.

SB 314/PA 95-665: Requires IDOT to include bicycle and pedestrian ways in certain cases.

PLANNING AGENCIES

SB 1201/PA 95-677: Creates the Comprehensive Regional Planning Fund, authorizing formula grants for local planning agencies, and making various other changes.

RAIL

HB 4/PA 95-641: Provides for the creation of a Rail Authority by the Winnebago County Airport Authority.

HB 566/PA 95-122: Creates the Southwest Suburban Railroad Redevelopment Authority in the counties of Bloom, Thornton, Calumet, Bremen, Orland, Worth and Palos.

TRAILS

SB 627/PA 95-670: Amends the Recreational Trails of Illinois Act providing for disbursement of funds.

FUTURE CITIES COMPETITION - CHICAGO REGION

IN CONJUNCTION WITH NATIONAL ENGINEERS WEEK

When an interstate bridge collapses during rush hour or broken levees destroy a major city, Americans are again reminded of the nation's crumbling infrastructure, but few people feel empowered to do anything about it. Beginning this fall, however, thousands of middle school students will tackle the issue of safety for the country's vast network of utilities, transportation, structures, and communications systems in the 2008 National Engineers Week Future City CompetitionTM.

Sponsored by the nation's professional engineering community, Future City aims to stir interest in science, technology, math and engineering among young people. Starting with the new school year, the competition asks students to work in teams under the guidance of a teacher and a volunteer engineer mentor to design and build a city of tomorrow. They must also conduct research for an essay on a pressing social need. This year, the essay centers on an issue straight from the headlines: How to monitor safety for the structures and systems that affect virtually every part of every person's life.

The Illinois-Chicago Future City Competition will be held on Saturday, January 26 at the University of Illinois at Chicago campus. The first-place winners will join winning teams from 39 other regions across the country for an all-expense-paid trip to the 16th annual Future City National Finals in Washington, D.C., February 18-20, 2008 during Engineers Week. National grand prize is a trip to U.S. Space Camp in Huntsville, Alabama. More than 30,000 students from 1,100 middle schools are expected to participate nationwide.

In Future City, the nation's largest engineering education program and among the most popular, students first create cities on computers using SimCity 3000 software and then build three-dimensional, tabletop models to scale.

To ensure a level playing field, models must use recycled materials and can cost no more than \$100. Students also write brief abstracts describing their city and must present and defend their designs at the competition before a panel of engineer judges who test the depth of the teams' knowledge.

That knowledge is often astonishing, evidenced by the essays which require the 7th- and 8th-graders to explore complex challenges that most adults would consider out of their league. This year's topic, "Keeping Our City Infrastrucure Healthy: Using Nanotechnology to Monitor City Structures and Systems," should prove particularly fruitful.

Engineers and researchers contend that nanotechnology, generally described as technology and devices operating at the molecular level, offers limitless potential. The essays must describe how built-in nanotechnology within a single component of their city's infrastructure, such as a tunnel or the water supply system, monitors for safety. Further, the monitoring system should include ways to resolve problems with a minimum of human intervention. The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) is this year's Future City essay sponsor.

Combining up-to-date findings on a cutting-edge technology with the eager minds of students as young as 12 can result in some eye-opening approaches, says Future City National Director Carol Rieg. "Engineers who have worked in their field for years often look at these essays and come away amazed at the advanced concepts," says Rieg.

VETERANS MEMORIAL TOLLWAY (1-355 SOUTH EXTENSION) GRAND OPENING

On Sunday, November 11th, 2007 the Illinois Tollway opened the I-355 South Extension. The Grand Opening Celebration included the dedication of the new roadway and its honorary title of Veterans Memorial Tollway. Activities throughout the day included: the Roll the Tollway 20-Mile Bike Ride, and SALUTE, Inc.'s Veterans Memorial 5K Run-Walk-Roll.

The celebration also featured family-oriented community festivals including Touch-a-Truck exhibits with construction equipment, Illinois State Police demonstrations, Blackhawk Military fly-over, and environmental agency displays. This celebration drew thousands from surrounding communities who participated in a once in a lifetime tribute to our nation's veterans and the first new toll road opening in 20 years.

The new 12.5 miles of the Veterans Memorial Tollway opened to traffic on Nov. 12. The \$730 million construction project began in late 2004 and will be completed on budget and ahead of schedule. Extending I-355 from its current terminus at I-55, south to I-80 through DuPage, Will and southern Cook County, the new road promises residents immediate reductions in travel time.

"The new I-355 South Extension is connecting Will County to jobs and providing opportunity for new development," said Illinois Tollway Executive Director Brian McPartlin. "But most importantly it will take people where they want to go quickly and efficiently and help people get back time - time to spend with their families and time to do things that are important to them."

The entire region is expected to benefit from mobility improvements that will more efficiently move goods, services and employees between I-55 and I-80 and beyond.

IDOT PRESENTED 2007 SAFETY LEADERSHIP AWARD

The American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) presented its 2007 Safety Leadership Awards to the Illinois, Minnesota and Missouri departments of transportation as the Standing Committee on Highway Traffic Safety continued work to heighten awareness to safety issues.

The awards were presented to the three agencies October 1 during the AASHTO Annual Meeting in Milwaukee. They were presented by committee Vice Chair Susan Martinovich, the director of the Nevada Department of Transportation.

The Safety Leadership Awards were initiated in 2005 to recognize AASHTO member states that have demonstrated themselves to be safety champions through actions that result in reduced serious injuries and fatalities.

Criteria for winning included leadership, working cooperatively with safety stakeholders, having or developing a comprehensive Strategic

Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), having a vigorous Highway Safety Improvement Plan, active participation in/on AASHTO, the Transportation Research Board National Cooperative Highway Research Program or U.S. Department of Transportation safety-related committees, panels or programs and a reduction in fatalities and/or serious injuries over a three-year period.

The Illinois DOT joined in Gov. Rod Blagojevich's emphasis on public safety by setting out to reduce highway fatalities and injuries. In 2004, IDOT established the position of State Safety Engineer and a Bureau of Safety Engineering, which serves as the primary point of contact for all IDOT safety engineering efforts. IDOT works closely with the Division of Traffic Safety as part of the SHSP and over the last five years, Illinois highway deaths have decreased from 1,420 in 2002 to 1,254 in 2006. It was the lowest number of fatalities since and 1924 and the department is trying to fulfill its goal of reducing fatalities to 1,000 or fewer by 2008.





MOVING THE REGION IN A NEW DIRECTION

At "Moving the Region in a New Direction: the Inaugural William O. Lipinski Symposium on Transportation Policy," on Monday, Oct. 15, at the W Hotel in downtown Chicago, global, national and regional transportation experts presented an array of possible answers to a crowd of regional and statewide transportation decision-makers. At the day-long, invitation-only forum, co-sponsored by McCormick Tribune Foundation, Metropolitan Planning Council (MPC), and Northwestern University, the conference's namesake encouraged attendees to leave the symposium invigorated by new ideas for solving the worsening ground transportation dilemma threatening Chicago.

"Often, the best ideas come from far and wide. That is why we are holding this symposium: to bring policymakers together with innovative thinkers and practitioners of best practices to find ways to improve Chicago's transportation network for the benefit of not only the region, but the nation and the world," said William O. Lipinski, former U.S. representative and former ranking minority member of the Aviation, Rail, and Highways subcommittees.

Keynote speaker U.S. Rep. James Oberstar (D-Minn.), chair of the House Committee on Transportation & Infrastructure, likewise urged participants to take a more global approach to developing a sustainable, integrated, multimodal transportation system in this region.

The majority of the day's presentations focused on new approaches to implementing, managing

and financing transportation projects. Guest speakers included Edward Hamberger, president and CEO, Association of American Railroads; Todd Litman, founder and executive director, Victoria Transport Policy Institute; Daniel Murray, vice president of research, American Transportation Research Institute; Gunnar Soderholm, director, Stockholm, Sweden's Congestion Charging Program, among others.

After hearing from these transportation experts, Chicago-area transportation decision-makers closed the day with a panel discussion on best approaches for Chicago and the state. Panelists were III. Rep. Julie Hamos (D-Evanston), chair, House Mass Transit Committee; Randy Blankenhorn, executive director, Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning; Ron Huberman, president, Chicago Transit Authority; Robert Schillerstrom, chairman, DuPage County Board; and Suzi Schmidt, chair, Lake County Board.

"Today's conference injected much-needed fresh thinking about ways to move people and goods, increase access, connect regional job centers, create more attractive places, reduce commutes – and pay for it all with minimal financial support from traditional government sources," said MarySue Barrett, president, Metropolitan Planning Council. "The next step is to identify the most feasible, high-impact ideas and test them on the ground in metropolitan Chicago."

NOVEMBER LUNCHEON IN ROCKFORD

About 75 professionals from the northwest region of Illinois attended a November 15 luncheon hosted jointly by Illinois Section ITE and the Illinois Society of Professional Engineer at the Cliffbreakers, in Rockford. The luncheon included a presentation by Mahmoud Etamadi, Bridge Program Engineer for the District 2 offices of the Illinois Department of Transportation in Dixon. Mr. Etamadi noted the increased public interest in bridge condition resulting

from the recent I-35W bridge collapse in Minnesota, explained the importance of a sound bridge inspection program, and highlighted bridge condition ratings for structures in northwest Illinois. He presented a summary of the District 2 bridge inventory and did a side-byside comparison of District bridges to those throughout the State and nation. Percentagewise the number of bridges in District 2 needing repair is below state and national norms.

PDH GUIDELINES

The Illinois Society of Professional Engineers (ISPE) has compiled the following helpful hints from past renewal periods, as well as conversations with the PE Board and IDFPR Staff.

EARNING HOURS:

The following are avenues for PDHs that you may not have known about:

Society Involvement - Under the PE rules, you may claim up to 2 PDHs for holding an office or participating on a committee for a professional society. The department has determined that you may only claim the two hours once per renewal period for that office, and not once per year you held that office. For instance, if you are the chapter secretary for two consecutive years, you may still only claim 2 PDHs, and not 4 PDHs, for that office during a renewal period. You may claim that office again the next renewal period. You may still claim up to 8 PDHs if you serve on different committees or hold other offices

Papers & Presentations - Under the PE rules, you may claim up to 10 PDHs for authoring a paper that is published in a national journal or trade magazine or presented to a professional society. The Board clarified that only 10 PDHs could be claimed in total, not 10 PDHs for having the paper published and 10 PDHs for presenting the paper, even if the paper is published in one renewal period and printed in another. There is no limit on the number of papers you may publish or present, however.

Patents - Under the PE Rules, you may claim 10 PDHs for patents received during the renewal period. There is no limit on the number of patents you may claim.

Teaching - PDHs may be claimed at a rate of 2 PDHs for every hour spent teaching a seminar. The PDHs may be claimed for the first time the seminar is taught, not simply the first time it is taught that renewal period. The seminar may not be taught for PDHs the next renewal period as well. Credit does not count for teaching as part of your regularly assigned duties.

REMINDER: DUPLICATE SEMINARS

If you attend a seminar in a renewal period for PDHs, you may not repeat the same seminar in that renewal period for PDHs. You may repeat the seminar in a subsequent renewal period for PDHs. (If you attend two seminars in the same renewal period with similar names, be sure to keep your back up materials to demonstrate that the two seminars were in fact substantially different.)

AUDITS:

The Division of Professional Regulation has begun PE Professional Development Audits. Several ISPE leaders themselves received audit notices. After speaking with department staff, the following are tips to help your audit go smoothly:

- Compile a summary sheet of your PDHs and how they were earned to serve as a cover sheet to your packet. THIS SHOULD NOT, HOWEVER, BE THE ONLY INFORMATION YOU SUBMIT.
- If you earned more than the thirty required hours, include all your hours, just in case a few appear questionable.
- When possible include copies of certificates for seminars you attended. Certificates are the best means of documentation in the department's eyes.
- Include back up material demonstrating the nature of the course content (handouts, program, etc.). This is particularly helpful if the name of the course does not adequately describe its relevance to the practice of engineering. When in doubt, send it.
- Keep a record and copies of everything you send in, just in case it is misplaced.
- Return the material requested in plenty of time prior to the deadline you are given.

If you do go through an audit, the information you send will be reviewed initially by a non-engineer reviewer. If your information appears straight forward and complete, the audit could end at that point. Only if there are questions will the design unit staff and/or PE Board become involved, so it pays to send organized and thorough documentation.





This catergory includes multiple span bridges in seismic category B, single span bridges in seismic category C, simple curved or flared structures and tall retaining walls requiring advanced analysis or non-standard support requirements. The new prequalification gives Civiltech the opportunity to compete in a completely new class of structural work.

APPOINTMENT AMTRAK NATIONAL DIRECTOR

Chicago, IL, November 19. Gov. Rod R. Blagojevich today congratulated Tom Carper, the former mayor of Macomb and Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) West Central region manager, on his nomination by Sen. **Dick Durbin** (D-IL) to serve on the national Board of Directors for Amtrak. The Governor also urged quick action on the nomination by the U.S. Senate.

Carper's nomination was put forward by Sen. Durbin and he was formally nominated by President Bush. The nomination must be confirmed by the Senate Commerce Committee and the full Senate. Despite taking on the new duties, Carper will continue in his current position with DCEO.

The Governor said that Carper led the fight to preserve passenger rail service in the region and state when he served as mayor of Macomb from 1991 to 2003. In 1991 Carper was appointed by the Amtrak Board of Directors to the Amtrak Mayors' Advisory Council and served as its Chair from 2000 to 2001.

Illinois expanded its partnership with Amtrak in October of 2007, when it doubled state funding from the Illinois Department of Transportation for the rail line to more than \$24 million to pay for increased service on three routes. In the year since the added service began, ridership on the state supported trains surged by 108 percent on the Chicago-St. Louis corridor. Ridership between Chicago and Carbondale is up by 67.4 percent for the state-supported trains and by 41.4 percent on the state-supported trains on the Chicago-Galesburg-Quincy route. In all, nearly 3.6 million passengers used Amtrak stations in Illinois in the last federal fiscal year.

Governor Blagojevich picked Carper to serve as regional director for the West Central region for Opportunity Returns, a regional economic development plan fostering job creation and targeted economic development. He graduated from Western Illinois University and served in the U.S. Army from 1967 to 1970 in Thailand and Vietnam. He was a small business owner-operator from 1971 to 1991 when he was first elected Mayor of Macomb.
