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DIRECTOR'S REPORT - TECHNICAL GROUP

On September 30th, 2009, forty professionals attended a full-day workshop on the Traffic Signal Timing Manual, which was held in Training Room B at the Illinois Department of Transportation District One Headquarters in Schaumburg, IL. The workshop was sponsored by ITE - IL Section and was conducted by Eddie Curtis, Traffic Management Specialist, and Edward Fok, Traffic Management / Systems Operations Engineer, for the Federal Highway Administration's Operations Team. The workshop focused on the fundamental concepts of signal timing and traffic signal control from an objective oriented perspective. The signal timing process, typical traffic signal equipment and the development of signal timing plans were examined in detail. Low cost methods for developing and optimizing signal timing were introduced and reviewed using exercises and examples.

The section hosted another webinar, "Technology-Oriented Safety Solutions: Red Light Camera Deployment", on November 17th, 2009, at two locations within the State of Illinois: Jacobs Engineering office in downtown Chicago and Engineering Enterprises, Inc. office in Sugar Grove. A special thanks to EEI for graciously providing lunch for attendees at that location. This was an ITE-member only event (Non-ITE members were able to attend by com-

pleting an ITE - IL Section Membership Application) and members were charged \$15, which included lunch and 1.5 professional development hours. Fifteen registrants attended the downtown Chicago location and nine attended the Sugar Grove location. The webinar was presented by the ITE Professional Development Program and instructed by Richard Retting, M.S., MITE, Vice-President of Sam Schwartz **Engineering.** The webinar provided an overview of the empirical information required regarding engineering data and analysis prior to the procurement of red light cameras and described the related regulatory factors and the procurement issues for practitioners charged with deployment and implementation of red light camera enforcement programs. At the conclusion of the webinar, participants were able to:

- Explain the regulatory issues related to deployment of red light cameras.
- Describe common procurement issues associated with contracting for red light camera services with private sector technology providers.
- Develop a plan for deployment of red light cameras that includes required resources and identification of success benchmarks.

The Illinois Section has plans to host more ITE webinars in 2010. Details will be released at a later date.

DIRECTORS REPORT - PUBLIC AFFAIRS GROUP

By Public Affairs Director Chad Hammerl. While the memories of Chicago 2016 are quickly fading there are still immediate transportation needs that, regardless of the Olympic bid, need to be addressed but requires funding.


The two primary sources of transportation funding in Illinois are the Illinois Capitol Bill, which passed last summer (a topic of previous ITEMS articles) and SAFETEA-LU, the federal transportation bill. SAFETEA-LU has already been extended twice and now is scheduled to expire December 18, 2009.

Due to the impending expiration of the federal bill, reauthorization becomes the primary objective, not only for Illinois, but for all transportation agencies. Word out of Congress is that SAFETY LU will receive another six month extension before a multi-year bill is passed. However, new double digit unemployment figures

have some in Congress pushing for the passage of a multi-year bill now. For better or for worse, the health care debate is dominating Congressional schedules.

Various drafts of a reauthorized bill included various levels of additional funding. As long as construction costs remain low, the number of improvements would be expected to increase. However, if construction costs increase like they did during the initial SAFETEA-LU, any funding increase would be wiped out by increased costs. The new bill is anticipated to continue most of the same programs of the current bill, but will include increased levels of accountability to document improvements, and increased flexibility with public-private funding initiatives.

Have a safe and joyous Holiday Season! More information on the reauthorization will come in the New Year.

DANGEROUS BY DESIGN

As presented in a report titled "Dangerous by Design" recently released by Transportation for America, , more than 76,000 Americans have been killed while crossing or walking along a street in their community in the last 15 years. More than 43,000 Americans – including 3,906 children under 16 – have been killed this decade alone. This is the equivalent of a jumbo jet going down roughly every month, yet it receives nothing like the kind of attention that would surely follow such a disaster.

Children, the elderly, and ethnic minorities are disproportionately represented in this figure, but people of all ages and all walks of life have been struck down in the simple act of walking. These deaths typically are labeled "accidents," and attributed to error on the part of motorist or pedestrian. In fact, however, an overwhelming proportion share a similar factor: They occurred along roadways that were dangerous by design, streets that were engineered for speeding cars and made little or no provision for people on foot, in wheelchairs or on a bicycle.

While it is still unnecessarily dangerous for pedestrians to walk, health experts are making the case that it can be just as deadly not to walk. Even as these preventable deaths mount, there has been a growing recognition that walking and bicycling – what many now refer to as "active transportation" – are critical to increasing levels of healthy exercise and reducing obesity and heart disease.

At the same time, it has become increasingly clear that these clean, human-powered modes of transportation are an essential part of efforts to limit the negative impacts of traffic congestion, oil dependency and climate change. In recent years, community after community has begun to retrofit poorly designed roads to become complete streets, adding sidewalks and bicycle lanes, reducing crossing distances and installing trees and crosswalks to make walking and biking safer and more inviting. The resulting safer streets have saved the lives of both pedestrians and motorists even as they pro-

mote health by leading many residents to become more physically active.

There still is a long way to go to repair the damage done to communities in the past, even as we begin to shift policies and design philosophy to build streets that are safer for pedestrians and motorists alike. However, there are a growing number of excellent models to build on and thousands of communities eager to move forward. The forthcoming rewrite of the nation's transportation policy presents a once-in-ageneration opportunity to create safer streets that will be critical to keeping our neighborhoods livable, our population more fit and our nation less dependent on foreign oil .

Researchers at the Surface Transportation Policy Partnership in the 1990s developed the Pedestrian Danger Index (PDI) in order to establish a level playing field for comparing metropolitan areas based on the danger to pedestrians. The PDI corrects for the fact that the cities where more people walk on a daily basis are likely to have a greater number of pedestrian fatalities, by computing the rate of pedestrian deaths relative to the amount of walking residents do on average.

The PDI shows that the most dangerous places to walk are those that fail to make smart infrastructure investments that make roads safer for everyone.

The most dangerous metropolitan areas in the U.S. for walking in 2007-2008 were: Orlando, Tampa, Miami, Jacksonville, Memphis, Raleigh, Louisville, Houston, Birmingham and Atlanta. Orlando tops the list because of its high pedestrian fatality rate of 2.9 pedestrian deaths per 100,000 residents, despite a very low proportion of residents walking to work, only 1.3 percent. In other words, the few people who do walk in Orlando face a relatively high risk of being killed by traffic.

NATIONAL HONORS FOR IDOT OP-ERATION TEEN SAFE DRIVING

November 5, 2009, Washington, DC. Roadway Safety Foundation (RSF) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) today recognized the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), Division of Traffic Safety's (DTS) "Operation Teen Safe Driving" program for its efforts to reduce teen driving-related deaths by implementing innovative peer-to-peer programs.

"Keeping teen drivers safe on the road is an obligation that we should all take seriously," said Greg Cohen, Executive Director of the Roadway Safety Foundation. "As the most inexperienced drivers on our highways, continuing driver education programs for teens are absolutely essential. By talking to teens where they listen, Illinois has set a great example for every state to follow."

Illinois' peer-to-peer teen driving program, in partnership with The Allstate Foundation and the Ford Motor Company Fund's Driving Skills for Life program, challenged teens to develop a school-wide program that would have a positive impact on teen drivers. The program, which was conducted completely by teens, was met with huge success, with a forty percent reduction in teen driving deaths from 2007-2008.

"We are honored to be recognized for our Operation Teen Safe Driving program," said IDOT's Division of Traffic Safety Director Michael Stout. "We strive each day to reduce fatalities in Illinois and we are proud to say this program has helped significantly with our mission. We could not do this without the dedication and commitment from our sponsors and the teens who have participated in the program."

"Ford Driving Skills for Life is very pleased to continue our successful partnership with the Illinois Department of Transportation and The Allstate Foundation. It is evident by the enormous success of Operation Teen Safe Driving that partnerships are the way to successfully

address the alarming teen driving statistics our country faces. Ford Motor Company Fund is committed to providing education and training to drivers of all ages, including teens. It is unacceptable that vehicle crashes are the number one killer of teens, and we will continue to provide support to combat this problem," said Jim Graham, Manager Community Relations, Ford Motor Company Fund and Community Services.

"The Allstate Foundation is committed to helping young people address the teen driving issue in their own voices with genuine messages respected by their peers," said Shaundra Turner, Senior Field Corporate Relations Manager, Allstate Midwest Region. "This important recognition demonstrates how much impact teens can have in reducing the epidemic of teen crash fatalities."

Roadway Safety Award recipients were evaluated on three criteria – innovation, effectiveness, and efficient use of resources. Program categories included: infrastructure improvements, operational improvements and program planning, development and evaluation. The award recipients were selected from 113 entries received.

Blue Ribbon Panel Judges included: Philip Caruso, Deputy Executive Director for Technical Programs, Institute of Transportation Engineers; Cathy Gillen, Managing Director of the Roadway Safety Foundation; Anthony Giancola, Executive Director of the National Association of County Engineers; James McDonnell, Deputy Program Director of Engineering, the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, and J. Peter Kissinger, President and CEO of the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety.

Roadway safety programs are a critical part of the nation's solutions to saving lives and preventing injuries on our nation's highways. Of the 37,261 people killed in traffic crashes on U.S. roads in 2008, nearly 59 percent of the

fatalities involved a departure from the roadway and 21 percent were at an intersection or intersection-related (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration 2008 Annual Assessment of Motor Vehicle Crashes).

IDOT ASSISTANT CHIEF ENGINEER ERIC HARM TO RETIRE

Eric Harm has announced his retirement from the Illinois Department of Transportation effective December 31, 2009. Mr. Harm received his Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in January 1979, and his Master of Science in Engineering degree from the University of California at Berkeley in June 1980. He began his career in 1980 in the Bureau of Materials & Physical Research, working his way up the ranks to Deputy Director/Assistant Chief Engineer.

As one of the first engineers hired to replace the retiring workforce of engineers who constructed the interstate system, he quickly rose through the ranks at the Bureau of Materials and Physical Research. He spent time as the Bituminous Operations Engineer and the Engineer of Physical Research, and in 1998, he was appointed Bureau Chief of Materials and Physical Research. In 2002, Mr. Harm left the Bureau of Materials and Physical Research when he was appointed Deputy Director, Assistant to the Chief Engineer of Highways.

During his tenure with the Department, Mr. Harm has been a strong advocate at the state and national levels for materials and pavement issues of concern to Illinois. Mr. Harm also

served on the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Official's Subcommittee on Materials. He has served for more than 15 years as one of the few state research engineers on the AASHTO Standing Committee on Research, which advises the AASHTO Board of Directors on research needs and votes on the national transportation research agenda.

VOTERS APPROVE 72% OF TRANSPORTATION MEASURES

This is an edited November 5, 2009 news release from the Center For Transportation Excellence. On November 3, 2009, voters across the country approved 72% of transportation ballot measures. In a rough economy and an off-year for elections, these results indicate that voters feel strongly about supporting transportation despite major economic challenges. This is a continuation of what we saw last fall when 77% of transportation measures were approved, even though many voters were already feeling the effects of a weakening economy. The results from the past two years are in line with what has been happening throughout the past decade. Since 2000, approximately 70% of all transportation measures have been approved, a rate double that of ballot measures generally.

This November, measures were on the ballot in five states—Colorado, Indiana, Maine, Michigan and Ohio. Of the seven measures, five were finance, one sought to establish a Regional Transportation District, and one to amend a city charter to require voter approval of all public transportation projects. Voters in Cincinnati, Ohio rejected the city charter amendment, which was designed to delay and obstruct public transportation projects. Voters also approved four out of five finance measures, generating over \$74 million for transportation.

Earlier in the year, three elections were held with transportation measures on the ballot. Of those three elections, a sales tax increase in Island County, Washington and a property tax increase in Kalamazoo County, Michigan, were both approved. Voters in Grand Rapids, Michigan came close to approving a property tax increase for a high-speed bus line, but in the end it did not achieve the necessary support. There is one more measure scheduled in 2009-voters in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma will be asked to approve a sales tax on December 8 to support a variety of projects, including a new rail-based streetcar system, potential com-

muter lines and a transit hub.

Even beyond the traditional ballot measures, November 3 was a good day for public transportation. The defeat of several local anti-rail candidates and anti-tax measures that could have limited funding can be seen as boons for transportation advocates. In mayoral races in Cincinnati and Charlotte, the pro-rail candidate won. Newly re-elected Mayor Mark Mallory strongly supports the 7.9 mile streetcar plan for Cincinnati. In Charlotte, voters elected City Council member Anthony Foxx, a strong supporter of the Charlotte Area Transit System and finding new funding options for transportation. In both cases, the defeated candidate was less supportive of transportation issues. This was also a key issue in city council races in Boise, ID, and at the ballot, the candidates with the stronger transportation agenda were elected.

On two statewide ballots this November, voters were faced with initiatives known as TABOR measures. In both Washington and Maine, these measures sought to impose spending limits on state and local budgets and require voter approval of any increases. In the past, places that have approved such measures have seen dramatic decreases in state and local budgets, requiring intense cuts to services like public transportation. Maine and Washington voters roundly defeated the measures, ensuring that needed services and infrastructure will not be neglected because of artificial limits on spending.

The Center for Transportation Excellence anticipates that 2010 will be an even more robust year for transportation elections. Both state legislatures and communities around the country began considering a variety of potential measures in 2009, but held off as a result of the economic downturn. After the November elections, American Public Transportation Association President William Millar made the observation that "at a time when unemployment is (Continued on page 14)

He continued on to identify the key lesson from these recent elections that "these votes for public transportation speak loud and clear: the public wants more public transportation service and is willing to pay for it." Already,

there are fifteen likely measures for ballots in 2010 and additional measures are expected to be announced in the coming months.


