

THE PRESS

FIRST IN WHAT MAY BE A SERIES OF REMINISCENCES OF A VERY OLD TIMER!

In June of 1950, the Division Engineer of the Cleveland office of the Ohio Department of highways, in an orientation lecture, told all the new engineers, "Make friends with the press." That admonition proved essential to his career within months-but that's another story.

In the 50's The Press was the media and vice versa. TV was in its infancy and the radio was pretty staid. The Press was therefore KING of mass communication. And there was plenty of royalty in the Chicago area. Every neighborhood in the City and most suburbs had a newspaper. Most of them were weekly but a goodly number were bi- weekly or even daily. But it was the four (4) Chicago dailies that led the pack, including the Tribune, Sun-Times, Herald American and Daily News. The first two were morning papers, the latter two, afternoon.

Each of the four major dailies had a reporter who covered traffic and transportation. They were all career employees and on general assignment except for the Tribune. The Tribune had a titled, "Transportation Reporter" in **Hal Faust**. All the reporters vied with each other for scoops and exclusives including the Tribune's Faust, **Horton Troutman** of the News, **Jim Enright** of the American and **Fletcher Wilson** of the Times.

Of the four, Faust probably enjoyed the most success, if that is measured by the number of front page and headline stories he authored.

As the recipient of the 2010 Young Member Award, I chose to attend the 2010 ITE Annual Meeting in Vancouver between August 8th and 11th that brought together fellow ITE members from all over the world. The sessions covered a breadth of topics including Pedestrian Safety and Automated Detection, Reducing Roadway Departure Crashes, Roadway and Intersection Safety Applications and Analysis, Design, Operation and Safety of Bicycle Facilities, and Sustainable Transportation Design and Planning.

The keynote speaker, two-time Gold Medalist **Catriona Le May Doan**, delivered an inspirational speech about the importance of working as a team to accomplish both individual and group goals. One of the highlights of the conference was when our own Illinois member, **John LaPlante**, received the Theodore M. Matson Memorial Award for his advancement of the profession through outstanding contributions in the field of traffic engineering. In addition, the Illinois Section ITE's 2010 Scholarship winner **Jiguang Zhao**, a Southern Illinois University PhD student, presented a New Method to Evaluate Roadway Lighting System and its Safety Effects. It was great to see our Section recognized for their accomplishments with so many other transportation professionals in attendance.

As you all know, the 2010 Winter Olympic and Paralympic Games were held in Vancouver earlier this year. When the City began planning to host the Games, their goal was to reduce vehicular traffic by 30% and to ensure that all events ran smoothly and efficiently. The challenge with reducing traffic was that it was expected that the amount of trips from all modes would increase by 30% while the road network

TECHNICAL GROUP - COMMITTEE REPORTS

SEMINARS COMMITTEE

On May 25th, 2010, the ITE - Illinois Section hosted the ITE Webinar, "Designing Urban Walkable Thoroughfares: A Context Sensitive Approach", at two locations within the State of Illinois: the Jacobs office in downtown Chicago and the City of Naperville. The webinar was presented by the ITE Professional Development Program and instructed by **James Daisa**, P.E. and **John Norquist**.

The webinar covered concepts included in the recently updated ITE publication, Designing Walkable Urban Thoroughfares: A Context Sensitive Approach along with supplemental information and case studies of practical applications that have been applied. The manual includes "best practices" that may be applied along side or in replace of previously established industry standards.

Participants are now able to understand, consider, and apply some of the more progressive techniques of design toward transportation projects including consideration for pedestrians.

On August 10th, 2010, twenty-five professionals attended a full-day workshop on the recently published Highway Safety Manual which was held at the DuPage County Convalescent Center building in Wheaton, IL. The workshop was sponsored by ITE - IL Section and was conducted by Fred Ranck on behalf of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The workshop included a broad overview of the newly published Highway Safety Manual (HSM). The HSM does not provide standards or guidance; however, it does provide a means to calculate typical crash frequency for various types of roads. The equations were developed based on data collected in a variety of areas. Calibration factors may be applied to develop estimates that are more representative of regions that may have not be incorporated as heavily into the data sets. Urban and suburban multilane roadways and intersections were covered. In addition, spreadsheets were provided to all participants to aid with calculation and comparison of crash frequencies for roadways with varied cross sections.

The Seminars Committee is planning many interesting professional development events in the last quarter of 2010 including regular webinars and potentially another workshop. As always we welcome ideas from the membership on webinar and workshop topics or suggestions to make these professional training events more worthwhile and enjoyable.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING COMMITTEE

Upon doing research for our Transportation Planning Committee a couple of noteworthy items were discovered. Based on the Americans with Disabilities Act free webinars have been developed to help professionals better design for the needs of the disabled including a webinar on accessible sidewalks and street crossings. But Faust's success was many times based on chicanery, sleight-of-hand and the creation of nonexistent controversies. But he was also the most tireless and connected member of the press. If he wanted to interview you, you would be interviewed. His "clout" extended to the highest levels of government.

Some time in the late 50's the Section Program Committee decided to have a, "Reporters" panel at a regular meeting. All of the four reporters initially agreed to participate but at the last minute Fletcher Wilson had to cancel. The Section asked each of the participants to do a short (say five minute) introduction of how a traffic engineer should respond to press inquiries, to be followed by an open question and answer dialogue. (It should be noted that while none of the reporters disagreed with the format outlined, subsequently it was apparent that most ignored it.)

By luck (?), of the draw, Hal Faust was the first speaker. He arrived early and under the aegis of a couple of senior ITE members enjoyed a very long cocktail hour and a bottle or so of wine with his dinner. Most of his introductory remarks which ran to about 20 minutes consisted of his duties as a war correspondent in Bavaria at the close of World War II including an interview with some Russian general (or was it George Patton?) and a detailed description of the Black Forest elves and their construction of cuckoo clocks!

Hort Troutman was next and asked us to drop the jargon. He felt it was employed as an elitist type of BS. And don't try to write the storythat's his job. The last speaker, Jim Enright made it clear it was not his job to help the traffic engineering profession. Rather he stated very forcefully that it was his job to find all those rat holes and manholes into which we were throwing the taxpayers' money.

The ensuing Q&A, only elicited more of Faust's elf stories and Enright's cynicism as he pointed out that if he wrote good things about traffic engineers' work he would probably end up on page 3 of the neighborhood section until there was a big fire which Commissioner Quinn attended, when he would be relegated to the obituary page, and then one of Tom Keane's top precinct captains would die and his story would be deleted completely and there went his Pulitzer!

Only Troutman attempted to impart anything constructive and generally couldn't be heard for the babble of other voices.

Section members generally learned two things:

- if a reporter calls, tell him you'll call right back; go to your boss with the reporter's phone number and let him return the call, and;
- if the reporter comes in the front door you go out the back door or the fire escape or some other emergency exit.

(If there is a follow-up article the personal experience with each of the aforementioned reporters will be described, some good, some almost catastrophic.)



ELIGIBILITY

Any member of the Illinois Section of ITE who has not reached his/her 35th birthday by September 1st, 2011 is eligible to win the 2011 Award. However, past and current presidents of the Illinois Section, student members, and previous Young Member Award winners are not eligible.

NOMINATION REQUIREMENTS

Nominations for the award may be completed by any current member of the Illinois Section of ITE. Self nominations are allowed. Nominees will be contacted to confirm that they meet the requirements of the award. Nomination forms (see attached) must be completed and returned via email to Tim Sjogren at TSjogren@Traffic-AD.com by 5:00PM on Friday, October 29th, 2010.

SELECTION PROCESS

Nominees who meet the award criterion will be contacted by a committee of Past Presidents following the October 29th deadline. Nominees wishing to be considered for the award will be asked to provide the following by December 10th, 2010:

A short application form highlighting their professional achievements and contributions to the Illinois Section

A current professional resume

Confirmation of willingness to attend either the District or International ITE conferences in 2011

A committee of the Past Presidents of the Illinois Section, chaired by the Immediate Past President, will review the nominations and select one award winner and one alternate. The winner will be announced at the Section's Annual Banquet in January 2011 and will be recognized with a plaque and acknowledgement on the Section website and in the ITEms newsletter. If the Award winner is unable to attend either of the conferences, the alternate will be notified and given an opportunity to attend on behalf of the winner.


RESPONSIBILITIES



JOHN GATES, JR. ELECTED AS New RTA board chairman

August 19, 2010, Chicago, IL. John Gates, Jr. was elected by Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) Board members today as the new Chairman of the RTA Board. Mr. Gates serves as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of PortaeCo, a private investment company. He will serve a five-year term that ends in 2014.

Until May 2010, Mr. Gates served as Chairman of the Board and Chairman of the Finance Committee of Metropolitan Pier and Exhibition Authority "McPier." Mr. Gates succeeds Jim Reilly who resigned in May to serve as the trustee of McPier.

"John Gates brings an exemplary career track record in the investment business. His noteworthy expertise in finance and infrastructure can't be overstated or under-utilized especially at this critical juncture in our transit system's history," said RTA Board Member Dwight Magalis, who represents Lake County and serves as the Board's Finance Committee Chairman. Before today's vote, Director Magalis served as Interim RTA Board Co-Chairman.

Prior to forming PortaeCo, Mr. Gates cofounded CenterPoint Properties Trust and served as Co-Chairman and Chief Executive Officer for 22 years. CenterPoint Properties is the former site of the U.S. Army Joliet Arsenal. Gates success of the site can be attributed to his innovative vision for the site to be an intermodal facility because it was adjacent to the Burlington Northern Santa Fe's main line in Chicago and in close proximity to nine interstate highways. During that period, the site opened as the largest intermodal container handling facility in the world and connected the BNSF and Union Pacific railroads, along with 17 million square feet of industrial space for the Chicago region. - University of Chicago, Harris School of Public Policy: Chairman of New Facilities Committee. The University of Chicago's Graduate School of Public Policy and Government Affairs.

Mr. Gates is also an active member of the Economics Club of Chicago and the Urban Land Institute. Former Board roles include:

capacity decreased by 20-30%. The City was able to achieve this goal by reallocating road space to create pedestrian corridors from noon to midnight, developing temporary games-time bike routes and some temporary bike parking, and providing improved wayfinding signage for pedestrians and cyclists. The City also developed Olympic Lanes for TransLink buses and Olympic-accredited vehicles available 24 hours per day, seven days a week and allowed truck deliveries in the overnight hours downtown. A future transportation goal that came out of the Olympic Games was to establish a legacy of increased public transit capacity and use and to become the most sustainable city in the world by 2020.

The first International Collegiate Traffic Bowl was held with winners from all ITE Districts, including Canada, competing against each other in a Jeopardy-style trivia game. Unfortunately, the Midwestern District champion, the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, lost in the first round. The students from Texas A&M won the Traffic Bowl and received a \$2000 check for their student section. It was really fun to cheer the students on and see the amount of transportation engineering knowledge they have gained while attending college.

It was an honor to be chosen by the committee as the recipient of the 2010 Young Member Award. Many thanks to ITE for this wonderful opportunity and also to Civiltech Engineering for supporting me as I serve the Section.



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
