
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President's Message

In Case You Missed It

Spring Luncheon with IDOT Secretary Blankenhorn

In March, Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) **Secretary Randy Blankenhorn** joined us for a luncheon to discuss the future of IDOT and transportation in the state. The sold-out event, which was cosponsored with local ASCE TD&I, ITS, WTS, and ISPE chapters, was one of the first opportunities for the transportation industry to be addressed by, and discuss policy with, the newly appointed Secretary. The overarching theme in Blankenhorn's address was 'innovation' and how the state's approach to building and maintaining its transportation infrastructure must be updated.



Improving efficiency of the department was identified as a key goal during the luncheon. The Secretary began his discussion by proclaiming IDOT needs to "get out of 1984 and move into the 21st century". Leveraging new technologies, such as paperless workflow, was an example of how costs can be reduced and project efficiencies increased.

"I want to make IDOT the most innovative DOT in the country" Blankenhorn proclaimed during his introduction. "Not only do we need to promote innovation [within the department], we need to empower our partners [to help innovate as well]."

Other topics Blankenhorn discussed included:

- Sustainable infrastructure funding from new revenue sources (such as expanded tolls, mileage fees, or other innovative options)
- Transfer of decision making power from state to local levels
- More participation from IDOT in national transportation policy (such as through AASHTO)
- Better communication and explanation of infrastructure improvement benefits to the public

In closing, the secretary reminded the group that infrastructure drives the state's economy and **Governor Rauner** wants to spend "billions and billions in infrastructure" in his term. But before infrastructure spending can increase, the current state budget gap must be rectified.

Note: As of May 28th, no state budget has been approved in Springfield. The current FY15 budget expires on May 31st.

Spring Luncheon - Loop Link

On April 16, 2015 the Illinois Section of ITE hosted a Luncheon titled Loop Link presented by Soliman Khudeira of Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) and Stan Wang of AECOM. The presentation covered the basics of bus rapid transit facilities and where these features are present in Loop Link. Loop Link will include dedicated bus lanes on Washington, Madison, Clinton, and Canal as well as dedicated bike lanes on Randolph, Washington, and Clinton. Bike signals will be provided along these dedicated bike lanes and in order for the buses to move more efficiently through the loop, Queue jumps will be provided so that buses get the green before the rest of the motoring public. Loop link will include eight elevated platforms with large canopies for passengers to wait under. Four are located on Washington and four on Madison. The new station placement was based on proximity to existing stop locations, maintaining spacing between stations, maintaining turns, and providing connections to other transit lines. All while avoiding alleys and driveways, and coordinating with stakeholders. Six bus routes will run on the Loop Link. The Loop Link will benefit the downtown greatly. Commute times will become faster and more reliable, multi-model connections between bus, rail, and bike will be improved, and more pedestrian traffic will be generated to retailers. A Review of the ITE Webinar: Integrating Safety into Project Development Process

On April 21st, the Illinois Section of ITE hosted a Snack and Learn for the ITE Webinar: Integrating Safety into Project Development Process. The webinar instructors included **Richard Coakley** from CH2M Hill, **Cindy Juliano** from CH2M Hill, and **Keith Harrison** from FHWA. ITE held the event at Jacobs Engineering's Chicago office.

The presentation started by explaining that the ITE/FHWA Informational Report was created to bridge the gap between safety analyses and the occasions that require quantitative results, like the CSS process. With the new tools like HSM that

provide quantification of safety, the report urges practitioners to have safety integrated into decisions.

The Informational Report includes a variety of information that covers:

- The tools, best practices, and resources to incorporate safety into the project development process
- The difference between nominal and substantive safety and how they can be integrated into the PDP. Nominal safety establishes design criteria or standards but does not provide any level of substantive safety that a certain quality of design is achieved.

 The considerations for safety in project development decisions, and how to balance safety with community, environmental, economic, and mobility measures are presented in the report.

 The knowledge base and tools available to practitioners for incorporating safety quantitatively into the PDP.



A ITE Recommended Practice Designing Workable Urban Thoroughfares: A Context Sensitive Approach

The presentation ended with the following summary, "The science of substantive safety provides quantitative estimates of roadway safety, which can be successfully used in project development and the detailed comparison of the effectiveness of safety improvements."

The presentation did not go into specific details on what tools or standards to use, because the report is not to be a standard but a supplement to all the current references available. For more information, visit http://www.ite.org/css.

The webinar was followed by a discussion of the event attendees on what could be applied from current tools to the projects that each was currently working on. A Review of the ITE Webinar: Road Diets - Improving Safety for all Users

On March 3rd, 2015 the Illinois Section of ITE hosted a Lunch and Learn for the ITE Webinar: Improving Safety For All Road Users. The three webinar instructors were **Tamara Redmon** from the Federal Highway Administration, **Brian Chandler** from Leidos, and **Keith Knapp** from the Iowa Local Technical Assistance Program. The webinar presenters **Keith Knapp** and **Brian Chandler** were part of the team of practitioners who developed the FHWA Road Diet informational guide. The ITE held the event at the offices of **Clark Dietz Inc.**, in Chicago.

Tamara Redmon started the webinar by introducing the new initiatives of the Department of Transportation on pedestrian and Bike Safety; the Secretary's New Initiative on Ped/Bike Safety, the Bicycle Safety Guide and Countermeasure Selection System, and the Resident's Guide for Creating Safer Communities for Walking and Biking. Then, Tamara introduced Road Diets as an innovative initiative identified by the office of Safety as one of the nine proven countermeasures that reduce crashes between 19% - 47% and improves safety for all users.





Brian Chandler continued the webinar by introducing the Road Diet Informational Guide from the Federal Highway Administration. The Informational Guide can be found here.

The webinar continued with an overview on the basics of Road Diets, what are, what they are not, and how they are implemented. The presenter then gave examples on Road Diets in different cities. A Road Diet is generally described as the conversion on a four-lane undivided road to a three lane (two through lanes and a two-way-left-turn-lane) that provides extra space on both sides of the roadway.

Other roadway configurations are available for road diets are:


- Four-lane to five-lane (decrease in lane width to provide a two-way left turn lane)
- Two-lane to three-lane (decrease in lane width to provide a two-way left turn lane)
- Three-lane to three-lane (lane width reduction to provide space on the outside)
- Five-lane to three-lane (lane width reduction to provide space on the outside for parking or bicycle lanes).





The presenter makes emphasis how Road Diet is not a cross section reduction of the curb to curb space but more a reallocation/rebalancing of the existing space to meet/accomplish existing needs. "Most Road Diets are installed on existing pavement within the right-of-way". This cross section reallocation improves safety with an overall crash reduction of 19% to 47%, reduces the number of conflict points on the roadway, and improves safety and accessibility for transit, pedestrians, and bicyclists.

As Road Diets have been implemented in different states, successful experiences of Road Diets were presented during the webinar. In Reston Virginia, the roadway was taken from a fourlane road to a two-lane road with the addition of a bike lane, the Road Diet resulted in a 70% reduction in traffic crashes.



Keith Knapp was the final presenter and concluded the webinar information on feasibility factors for implementing a Road Diet. To determine the feasibility of a Road Diet to be a potential solution different factors need to be taken into account including objective of the project, safety factors, need for Context Sensitive Solutions, operational factors, and bicycle and pedestrian considerations.

At the conclusion of the webinar, members discussed definitions on Road Diets and shared personal experiences on projects. The webinar viewing was well attended and the Technical Group

looks forward to doing more viewings in the city. The Section thanks all the participants that joined us during this webinar and Clark Dietz for hosting this webinar event in their Chicago office.

2015 Annual WTS Conference Recap

This year's WTS Annual Conference was held in Chicago, Illinois May 20-22. The conference theme - Converge - mirrored Chicago's place as the hub of the nation's transportation network where modes and systems converge by reflecting the idea of converging, of bringing together our different skills and perspectives. The Innovation Conference on Asphalt and Transportation (ICAT) was held April 7-8 at the Par-A-Dice Hotel and Casino in Peoria, Illinois. The mission of ICAT (as stated on the conference website at http://icat.bradley.edu/vision/) is "to develop a network of business executives, policymakers, and scholars from around the USA. The objective is to promote business partnerships, align and leverage new alliances, explore creative funding sources, and address challenges facing the infrastructure industry. Mr. Steve Friedman, President of SB Friedman Development Advisors, gave a presentation on Value Capture and how it is one solution for Transportation Funding. **Mr. Randy Blankenhorn**, Acting Secretary at IDOT, provided an IDOT update. A DBE focus group panel, made up of **Cherryl Thomas**, President/CEO of Ardmore Associates, **Mary Lamie**, Vice President of EFK Moen, and **Ramon Dela Cruz**, Vice President of Millenia Professional Services of IL, provided insight on how they started their DBE firms and the challenges they face in the transportation industry. The Honorable **John Cullterton** of the Illinois State Senate gave a speech on Sustainable Funding and Capital Bill for Illinois. The conference concluded with panel discussion on Sustainable Funding Options of Infrastructure in Illinois summarizing the findings from the Executive Summit sponsored by **\$FIG**. State-of-the-art technology tests central Illinois drivers

Rauner prepares to close state museums, shutter some prisons to balance 'phony' Democratic budget

Gov. Bruce Rauner threatened real financial pain for all Illinois - from businesses and prisons to the poor and the elderly - as he took Springfield's stalemate over state spending to a new level Tuesday.

"House Speaker Mike Madigan, Senate President John Cullerton and their caucuses passed a budget for the 2016 fiscal year beginning July 1 that is nearly \$4 billion in the hole," said the governor's office on Tuesday as it announced planned cuts to programs in nine different state departments.

Rauner announced cuts affecting families, the poor and the elderly as well as the immediate shelving of the Illiana Expressway project and business incentives and film tax credits. In all, the cuts will save about \$400 million, the governor's office said.

"Speaker Madigan, President Cullerton and the politicians they control refuse to act responsibly and reform state government," Rauner spokesman Lance Trover said in a press release. "It is time they come to the table with Governor Rauner to turnaround Illinois." But this isn't about governing, Rep. Lou Lang, D-Skokie, shot back. It's about politics. The governor's own proposed budget was \$2.2 billion out of balance.

"The governor has declared all-out war on the citizens of the state of Illinois because he's peeved with the Democratic majorities in the House and Senate," Lang said, adding: "It's a path that's carefully chosen to strike at the values and principals of what the majority of the members of the Legislature believe in."

But Republican leaders disagree.

"The governor's hands are tied," said House Republican Leader Jim Durkin, R-Burr Ridge. "He's preparing for a scenario where there's no budget or a budget that is \$4 billion out of whack." The steps the Rauner administration is initiating "in order to begin balancing the phony Madigan-Cullerton budget" affects the following immediately:

- Suspension of "future incentive offers to companies for business attraction and retention" including EDGE Tax Credits, Large Business Attraction Grants, Employer Training Investment Program Incentive Grants and Prime Sites Grants. The state will defer application approvals for film tax credits and High Impact Business designations.
- A shelving of the Illiana Expressway. The Illinois Department of Transportation will remove the project from its current multi-year plan. "It is the determination of IDOT that

the project costs exceed currently available resources. The Department will begin the process of suspending all existing project contracts and procurements," the governor's office said.

The following are cuts the governor's office will roll out:

- Starting July 1, the Illinois Department of Transportation will "ground" state plane passenger service.
- Starting July 1, the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity will suspend the program that helps the poor pay for winter heat. The \$170 million federal money earmarked for the program will continue.
- The Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice will begin to identify one or two prisons that can be closed because the facilities are not filled, the governor's office said.
- The Illinois Department of Corrections will begin the process of closing Hardin County Work Camp, and 180 inmates will be moved.
- The Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services will audit nursing home payments to make sure they're complying with new rates, and it will recover any money overpaid while implementing penalties for improper billing.
- The Illinois State Police will freeze new vehicle purchases.
- The Illinois Department on Aging will raise the requirements to qualify for the agency's Community Care Program, which keeps seniors at home and out of nursing homes. The AARP Illinois office said 39,000 seniors will be affected.
- The Department of Human Services will increase copays for parents using the Childcare Program and freeze intake and create waiting lists. It will also begin background checks for relatives providing child care.
- The Department of Natural Resources will close the five state museums, and it won't award grants to local governments to develop parks or open space.

"Unfortunately, today's actions signal that the governor would rather slash child care, services for troubled youth and senior care rather than work on a bipartisan budget solution," a spokeswoman for Cullerton said.

But that "over-the-top rhetoric will prevent us from coming to any resolution," shot back a spokeswoman for Senate Republican Leader Christine Radogno, R-Lemont. "We're hopeful there will be compromises, and the Democratic majority will be willing to work with Gov. Rauner."

Legislators won't be having a quiet summer.

House Speaker Michael Madigan, D-Chicago, told his members they should be prepared to return to Springfield Thursday, and Cullerton, D-Chicago, told his members they'll return later in June.



















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
